### SOUARES and GARDENS







Perhaps the most famous of Bloomsbury's celebrated garden squares is Russell Square. Designed as the centrepiece of the 5th Duke of Bedford's development plans and built by James Burton, Russell Square is linked to Bloomsbury Square by a central axis along Bedford Place.

Humphry Repton, the famous garden designer, completed this visual link with statues of the Duke of Bedford (in Russell Square) and his friend the Whig politician Charles James Fox (in Bloomsbury Square).

Other garden squares include the private Bedford Square, the only intact Georgian garden square in London and Montague Street Garden which are opened each year as part of Open London Gardens Weekend.

Public green spaces include Gordon Square, Tavistock Square with its statue of Ghandi and memorial to the victims of the 7/7 London bombings, Brunswick Square, Coram Fields and St George's Gardens.

It's these areas and their gentle elegance that signify Bloomsbury as a haven of green in the heart of the City.

### LITERARY CONNECTIONS





Home to some of the best libraries and academic institutions, it is unsurprising that Bloomsbury has inspired some of the world's most celebrated writers. The area is also brimming with independent publishers and booksellers of the highest calibre.

> Perhaps best known for the works of Virginia Woolf and her fellow Bloomsbury Group writers, the area is also responsible for providing TS Eliot with a role at Faber Poetry, the setting for George Orwell's 1984 (Senate House/Ministry of Information) and giving JK Rowling a platform from which Harry Potter was launched to the world by Bloomsbury

### **EDUCATION**







Bloomsbury boasts some of the oldest and most prestigious schools and colleges in the UK.

The University of London has made Bloomsbury the base for a number of its colleges, including the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine and Bedford College. Founded in 1849, Bedford College was the first higher education college for women in the UK. Having played a

leading role in the advancement of women in higher education and in public life in general, it became fully coeducational in the 1960s.

Close by is Royal Academy of Dramatic Art (RADA) which claims some of the world's leading actors among its alumni.

> Other academic institutions include School of Oriental and Asian Studies (SOAS), the Architectural Association, New College of Humanities,

Ecole Jeannine Manuel School and Alain de Botton's School of Life.

## BLUE PLAQUES and RESIDENTS





Virginia Woolf, Bob Marley and Gandhi are an unexpected mix of residents for any area but then Bloomsbury has never conformed to the norm.

Renowned for its eclectic community of writers, intellects, artists and philosophers, Bloomsbury has been called 'home' by many celebrated and historically significant people.

The abundance of Blue Plaques that adorn the streets' Georgian facades provide an insight into the breath of talent that has created Bloomsbury's rich heritage and has left an unrivalled legacy for the people of its future.

Blue Plaques include The Bloomsbury Set, British Museum benefactor Sir Hans Sloane, Millicent Garrett Fawcett. Charles Dickens. TS Eliot, Bertrand Russell and Sir Harry Ralph Ricardo.

#### **MUSEUMS**

Although the British Museum is unquestionably the jewel in Bloomsbury's museum crown, the area also forms a large part of the Museum Mile which features major, hidden and quirky exhibitions alike.

Gems not to be missed include The Foundling Museum which explores the history of the Foundling Hospital, the UK's first

children's charity and first public art gallery and The Dickens Museum which holds the world's most important Dickens collection with over 100,000 items including manuscripts, rare editions, personal items, paintings and other visual sources.

The Petrie Museum is one of London's lesser-known museums dedicated to Ancient Egyptian archaeology and The Grant Museum of Zoology has become known as a "quirk of nature and history, a haven of polished wood and pickling jars".

Anna Maria Duchess of Bedford, who was a lifelong friend of Queen Victoria, is credited with inventing the English custom of afternoon tea. The Brunswick Centre, Southampton Row and Tottenham Court Road all offer a wide range of larger retailers, cafes, bars and fast food outlets.


